

New Bishops To Serve United Methodist Conference, Serbian Orthodox Diocese

Early fall will see the arrival of new church leaders in our area. We welcome the newest members of our Council of Bishops and Judicatory Executives: **Bishop Cynthia Moore-Koikoi** and **Bishop Irinej**.

Bishop Moore-Koikoi will serve the Western Pennsylvania Conference of the United Methodist Church; she is the first woman to serve as bishop in the conference.

Most recently, Bishop Moore-Koikoi served as the superintendent of the Baltimore-Metropolitan District. In the wake of Freddie Gray's death and the protests that followed, she became an important spiritual leader in Baltimore, leading the United Methodists' efforts in ministering to the city's marginalized neighborhoods.

Her role during Baltimore's unrest reflects her larger hope of unity for the denomination and the church as a whole. "We have an opportunity to show the world what it might look like for brothers and sisters to dwell together in unity," she said. "And it is going to be that witness that claims souls for Jesus Christ!"

Another newcomer to our region, Bishop Irinej, will lead the Serbian Orthodox Church Diocese of Eastern America.

Bishop Irinej, who has served as Bishop of Australia and New Zealand since 2006, grew up in Cleveland, and has been a seminary professor and a consultant on international affairs for the Serbian Patriarch.

Ecumenical relations have been central to Bishop Irinej's ministry. He currently represents the Serbian Orthodox Church to the World Council of Churches Central Committee. Additionally, he co-chaired the Orthodox Advisory Committee of the National Council of the Churches of Christ.

In a chapter he wrote for the Orthodox Handbook on Ecumenism, Bishop Irinej affirms, "Fundamentally at the heart of all ecumenical enterprise is the very culture and spirit of dialogue, seeking mutual understanding and exchange."

Our prayers are with both new leaders as they begin work in our region. May God grant them many years!

Local Leaders Participate in Holy and Great Orthodox Council

It was a gathering 1,200 years in the making. In June, the first global Orthodox Council to meet since the Second Council of Nicaea brought together delegates representing 10 of the 14 autocephalous (self-governing) Orthodox churches in the world.

Two Southwest Pennsylvanians traveled to Crete for the Council: **Bishop Gregory of Nyssa**, Primate of the American Carpatho-Russian Orthodox Diocese, and **Bishop Emeritus Donald McCoid** of the Southwestern PA Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. Here, they reflect on the Council in their own words:

Each of the ten Churches was represented by its Primate along with 24 Bishops. The Ecumenical Patriarchate of Constantinople has approximately 150 Bishops around the world. From among this group, His All-Holiness Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew appointed me to his delegation. I was stunned by the decision, since I have been a Bishop less than four years. What a tremendous honor for my Diocese!

The Council began on the Feast of Pentecost with the celebration of Orthros (Matins) and the Divine Liturgy with all ten Primates participating and amazing chanting

REFLECTIONS ALONG THE WAY


Dear friends,

Every day at 5:21 p.m., the Rev. Joseph Hedden's phone rings. It's no mistake: he set the odd time on Epurpose. It's 17:21 in military time, for John 17:21, Jesus' prayer "that they may all be one." As he hears the alarm, the pastor of Emmanuel Reformed Church in Export stops whatever he's doing, and prays for the unity of Christ's church.



When Pastor Joseph described this prayer practice at the United Church of Christ's Penn West Conference annual meeting this summer, I knew I had to try it out myself. Perhaps you'd like to join in, too. Here are some ideas to inspire the first week of your prayers:

Day One: Pray for the congregations in your own conference, diocese, presbytery, or synod. Ask that they be freed from rivalry, pettiness, and gossip, so that they might pursue a common mission.



Day Three: Pray that the church may no longer be divided by race. Ask God to end the sin of racism, to help us repent for our complicity in it, and to lead us into renewed and reconciled relationship with people of every race.

Day Four: Pray for Christians with whom you disagree. Imagine the believers who hold the opposite view from you on an issue that affects you deeply. Then pray that the Spirit might open all hearts, yours as well as theirs, in creative new ways.

Day Five: Pray for Christian Associates and other ecumenical organizations, including the local ministerium in your community.

Day Six: Pray that one day our unity might be expressed in the sacraments. Pray that all Christians might come to one table, to share the loaf and cup in celebration, wonder, and joy. Pray that our own altars and tables today may offer us a foretaste of that shared banquet – and that we might enjoy it not only in the world to come, but right here, and in our lifetimes.

Day Seven: Pray like Jesus, using the words of the high priestly prayer: "I pray that we may all be one, Lord, even as you and your Father are one."

Of course, prayer is not only a channel through which God can change the world. It's also exercise for our own hearts. Prayer changes us. If we pause each day to pray for the unity of the church, not only will God respond, but we will find ourselves responding too, bringing our prayers to life, and making unity visible in our world. Are you ready? Get out your phone, set your alarm, and let's get started.

groups on each side of the Cathedral. Orthodox worship services in all their glory – the Holy Spirit was with us.

The official work of the Holy and Great Council commenced the next day. As we began with prayer, the room was filled with the Holy Spirit. You could feel the joy, compassion and love of all those gathered in the Name of the Lord. It felt as if we were on fire — an incredible experience.

Before the Council were six draft documents dealing with various aspects of Church life. They had been prepared over the last 50 years in several Pre-Conciliar Meetings. The Bishops presented their views and suggested changes. In the end all six documents were approved.

An Encyclical, a Message, and all of the documents are available at www.orthodoxcouncil.org.

During the time of the Council I was able to be the same room with many of the 20th Century's greatest Orthodox theologians. I have read many of their works over many years and it was wonderful to be in their presence.

My hope and prayer is that the Holy and Great Council will become a frequent event in the life of the Orthodox Church, for there are many more things to reflect upon, discuss and decide as God-fearing people in the contemporary world.




