### SPARK Conversations Ignite Collegiality, Collaboration Among Christian Leaders

In the coming year, Christian Associates will seek to kindle the fires of friendship and collaboration among clergy and leaders in our region through a brand new initiative: SPARK Conversations.

SPARK Conversations is a series of informal lunch gatherings for Christians in our region who share a common role, interest, or identity. It seeks to bring leaders together across boundaries of tradition, denomination, and theology to find unexpected common ground, and build new collaborative possibilities.

*"Collegiality is one of our core values at Christian Associates,"* said Rev. Liddy Barlow, CASP's Executive Minister.

*"SPARK Conversations seeks to extend that collegiality beyond our Council of Bishops and Judicatory Executives, to all the pastors and other Christian leaders in our region."*

The series begins on **October 27** with a gathering for **clergy under age 40**, and continues on **November 5** with a session for **Christian educators**. Both lunches will begin at noon and last until 1:30 p.m.

*"Anyone who self-identifies with the group of the day is welcome to attend,"* said Rev. Barlow, *"Members of our Christian Associates judicatories, neighbors from other churches – let's draw the circle wide."*

**Forest Hills Presbyterian Church, 820 Ardmore Blvd. in Pittsburgh, will host the lunches.** The church is conveniently located directly off the Parkway East.

The series will continue in January, with gatherings planned for seminarians, university chaplains, pastors of large churches, and more.

Participants are asked to make a suggested donation of \$10-\$15 each to help cover the cost of lunch, though all are welcome regardless of ability to pay. Advance registration is strongly encouraged.

Its mission is to *"empower incarcerated and released individuals to restore their relationship with their God, rebuild their lives, and reconcile to their communities."*

Admission is \$75 per person or \$700 for 10 people, and includes heavy appetizers and a drink ticket.

# REFLECTIONS ALONG THE WAY

Dear friends,

In June, as part of Christian Associates' ongoing interest in racial reconciliation, I attended the third Annual Corporate Equity and Inclusion Roundtable, presented by the Black Political Empowerment Project and hosted by Duquesne University. This event brings together leaders in the business, civic, and non-profit communities to promote racial diversity in the corporate world.

While the Roundtable was full of important statistics and valuable insights, one comment especially intrigued me. A speaker referred to the importance of reaching out beyond our usual networks and getting to know new people. *"Don't keep turning the same people around on the Rubix cube,"* she entreated us.

What a powerful image! It's true, isn't it, that we often return to the same group of known colleagues, rotating their Rubix squares around and around. I've experienced that in my own work here at Christian Associates: all too often, there are two or three people I call to talk about environmental issues, two or three others who are interested in hunger, another small group who are interested in gun violence.

I'm sure these few people are not the only Christian leaders in our region who are passionate about these issues! But it's easy to stick with the people we already know, turning them around the Rubix cube, instead of meeting new people and building new relationships.

The same can be true in our congregations, as well: the same people teach Sunday school and serve on the vestry and bring in cookies for the bake sale and count the weekly offering. A small inner circle takes responsibility for most congregational work, while others remain unengaged in the life of the church. Turning the same people around on the Rubix cube leads over-worked leaders to burnout. It also means that we never hear the perspectives and ideas of those outside these small groups. *Who knows what we could be missing?*

In the past 45 years, Christian Associates has seen what happens when people with common roles and values reach beyond their usual communities to build relationship with each other. We've watched our Council of Bishops and Executives bring together people who might never meet in any other space – leaders who are conservative and liberal, from small judicatories and large ones, who are Catholic, Anglican, Orthodox, and Protestant.

We've seen them smile as they find that others share their same challenges and know their same joy. We've experienced how collaboration grows out of these relationships, how a shared concern about racism or violence or health care begins in casual conversation and leads to real change in our communities. We've learned that sometimes all it takes is getting the right people around the right table at the right time, and the Spirit does the rest.


Why should the bishops and executives have all the fun? This fall, as we launch SPARK Conversations (see page 1), we hope to help make these same relationships and collaborations happen between other Christian leaders: clergy and seminarians and lay leaders alike. Each month we'll be convening an informal lunch for leaders who share a common role, interest, or identity. We'll cross the usual boundaries of denomination and theology and focus on what we have in common. We'll have the opportunity to meet new people, expand our usual circles, and draw even more colleagues into the conversation.

Let's expand our Rubix cubes. I'll see you at SPARK!


This fall, the choir plans special compline services to observe All Saints Day and the Thomas Merton centennial.

## Holocaust Educators to Gather at Seton Hill

This year, the conference will take place **October 25-27**, with the theme "*The Holocaust and Nostra Aetate: Toward a Greater Understanding.*"


The Second Vatican Council document *Nostra Aetate* revolutionized Catholic theological understandings of Judaism, but the document came too late for the millions of Jews who perished in the Holocaust. In the fifty years since *Nostra Aetate*'s publication, relations between Catholics and Jews have improved dramatically, but there is still much to be done.

The keynote speaker at the conference will be Fr. Patrick Desbois, author of *The Holocaust by Bullets*. He is the founder and president of Yahad-In Unum, an organization that identifies and commemorates the sites of Jewish and Roma mass executions in Eastern Europe during World War II.


