In Memoriam

The regional ecumenical community has suffered the loss of three highly committed Christian leaders in recent months. In their own unique ministries Metropolitan **Archbishop Basil Schott**, **Rev. John Bucher** and **Rev. Paul Everett** worked for the wholeness of Christ's Body, the Church. "*Rest eternal grant them, O Lord; And let Light perpetual shine upon them.*"

Archbishop Basil Schott O.F.M.



His eminence, Metropolitan Archbishop Basil Schott, died on June 10, 2010 after a seven month battle with cancer. Since 2002 he served as the Archbishop of Pittsburgh and the leader of the Byzantine Ruthenian Catholic Church in America. A native of Freeland, Luzerne County, he entered the Byzantine Franciscan novitiate at 19 and was ordained in 1965. In 1996 he became bishop of Parma.

With 60,000 members from Erie to El Paso, TX,

Archbishop Schott's eparchy was less than one-tenth that of the Latin Catholic Diocese of Pittsburgh. But he outranked his Latin colleagues. Schott led the only self –governing Eastern Church in the USA. Eastern Catholic Churches, often called "Greek Catholics," with roots in Eastern Europe and the Middle East, are in full communion with the pope, but closely resemble Orthodox Churches in worship and theology.


The Archbishop was an avid ecumenist serving on the Executive Committee of the Christian Associates Council of Bishops and Judicatory Executives, and was a member of the Christian Leaders Fellowship and the Religious Leadership Forum of Southwest PA. Because of living in the tensions between Eastern and Western Christianity, he had a deep appreciation for the ecumenical journey. Within the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, Archbishop Schott promoted evangelization and monasticism. He routinely attended gatherings of global bishops in Rome. Pope Benedict XVI named him to the office that handles the pope's relationship with Eastern Churches.

Numerous members of the Christian Associates Council, Eastern and Latin Catholic bishops, Archbishop Nicholas and priests of the Carpatho-Russian Orthodox Church joined the Byzantine faithful for the Funeral Divine Liturgy at the Cathedral of St. John the Baptist in Munhall on June 18.

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REFLECTIONS ALONG THE WAY

Dear Siblings in Our Lord,

I begin with a disclaimer. I am not opposed to organizations whose mission may include supporting youth development, empowering women, fighting bigotry and racism, or advocating for justice. Just the opposite, you will find me personally supporting and encouraging many groups with such a mission.

However, I do have an issue with the "*re-branding*" of some organizations like NCCJ, YWCA and YMCA. All have in their evolution diminished "*Christian*" in their mission statements, identity and marketing. Once known as the National Conference of Christians and Jews, NCCJ has now become the National Conference for Community and Justice. Recently, the YMCA made headlines for re-branding as "The Y." A visit to



the YWCA's national web site finds "Christian" as but part of the historic description of the organization.

Can any group claim to be Christian without some explicit confession of Jesus as the Christ, and that all life is transformed and molded by that confession? Indeed, every organization has a right to continually refocus its mission and identity. I rejoice that The Y has just broken ground for a new facility in the Hill District of Pittsburgh, for their sheltering of the marginalized and summer camps for kids. Great work indeed! Likewise, I can embrace the racial and justice endeavors of the YWCA. Both Y's do good work for our communities. That is not my point.

My point is the challenge of our retaining a particular Christian identity as we seek to live in an ever increasingly secular environment. What does it mean for any organization to be Christian as our country becomes more pluralistic, more religiously diverse and no longer with a WASP, let alone Christian majority?

Can any group claim to be Christian without some explicit confession of Jesus as the Christ, and that all life is transformed and molded by that confession? I'm not a Thomas Jefferson who excised vast parts of the scriptures to merely the moral teachings of Jesus. To use the name Christian, at least for me, implies an explicit affirmation that Jesus Christ is the Divine Lord and Savior.

As I've engaged in some interfaith work recently, I wrote:

I want to believe, and hope that you agree, that true interfaith and secular engagement can only take place for those of us who claim to be Christian when we are clear and articulate about the particularity of our faith.

As America becomes ever more diverse ethnically, racially and religiously, we all need to develop an appreciation for our neighbors who may be different. One may learn about another culture's traditions, customs, holidays, and beliefs without compromising the uniqueness of one's own identity.

While I embrace a diverse and pluralistic country, I want to believe, and hope that you agree, that true interfaith and secular engagement can only take place for those of us who claim to be Christian when we are clear and articulate about the particularity of our faith. I wish NCCJ, YMCA and YWCA well in their redefined missions, even while I grieve their departure from an explicit Christian identity.



Rev. John R. Bucher

A minister of the United Church of Christ, Rev. John R. Bucher died on June 24, 2010 at the age of 86. Born in Shenchow Fu. China, in the Hunan Province to missionary parents, he later moved to Lancaster, PA where he graduated from high school, Franklin & Marshall College, and the Lancaster Theological Seminary. He served numerous congregations in the Pittsburgh Synod, E&RC and the Penn West Conference, UCC, retiring in 1989 from the Birmingham

Rev. Bucher was very active with the Board of Delegates of Christian Associates and served on the Communications and Television Ministry Committees. His funeral was from the Birmingham UCC, Carrick on June 29.

Minister, Paul was a graduate of Syracuse University and Princeton Theological Seminary. Upon graduation, he became Minister of Evangelism at Wayne Presbyterian Church and later served as Associate and then Executive Director of The Pittsburgh Experiment, a ministry to business and the working community in the city.

In 2005 Rev. Everett wrote, The *Prisoner*, a biography of a man who served time in prison for murder before experiencing a spiritual transformation that led to his release and a new life as a Capuchin Franciscan brother, James Townsend. In partnership with Christian Associates Television and Paulist Press, he helped produce a video with Brother Jim, and his spiritual director, Fr. Lester Knoll. Paul conducted retreats in prisons based on the book and video.

A local memorial service for Rev. Everett will be held on Saturday, September 18 at 2:00 p.m. at Memorial Park Presbyterian Church, Allison Park, PA.

Flood Recovery Complete, New Work Beaun

Long Term Recovery efforts from the June 2009 Pitcairn-Turtle Creek-Wilkins Township flooding are near completion. A faith-based and community recovery team guided volunteers and challenged financial support for restoration efforts to residents impacted by the flash flooding.

On July 10 a celebration was hosted for the three communities and those aided in their return to normalcy. One of the children, who spent the night before his 8th birthday at the storm shelter said, "I don't want anyone to go through a flood, but I know it will happen again. I know that my family and everyone will be there to help – help is what got us through the sad times. It was tough, but everyone worked together. Together we can get through anything."



Flash flooding hit the Chartiers Valley this summer. The local recovery committee is actively working with impacted households to make repairs. Christian Associates

serves as the administrator and fiduciary agent for the Western PA VOAD (Volunteer Organizations Active in Disasters).

Presbyterian–Jewish Conversations

At the request of Jewish Communities of Greater Pittsburgh, Pastor Don Green, Executive Director of Christian Associates (CASP) has convened two conversations related to the 219 General Assembly (GA), Presbyterian Church USA.

Prior to the July Assembly Commissioners from the five CASP member presbyteries were invited to meet with representatives of the Jewish community to discuss proposed legislation on Middle East Peace. At the conclusion of that pre-GA conversation marked by respectful exchanges of opinion, the group requested that a post-GA conversation be convened and moderated by Pastor Green. The second conversation was held on August 31.

The GA approved a comprehensive report on the Middle East – its first since 1997. The paper calls for:

- An *immediate cessation of all violence*, whether perpetuated by Israelis or Palestinians;
- The *reaffirmation of Israel's right to exist as a sovereign nation* within secure and internationally recognized borders in accordance with United Nations resolutions;
- The end of the Israeli occupation of Palestinian territories;
- An immediate freeze on the establishment and expansion of Israeli settlements in the West Bank, and on the Israeli acquisition of Palestinian land and buildings in East Jerusalem; and
- Many other steps toward peace in the region.
